

Want to enjoy Tiny Thursdays at home? Explore a DAI artwork, watch a virtual read-aloud story and then follow along with project instructions found below!

### **Torn Paper Sunset Silhouette**



**Project Description**: young artists learn about all the animals that live in a particular tree and use tearing and painting skills to make their own animal silhouette landscape.

<u>Story</u>: <u>There Was a Tree</u>, written and illustrated by Rachel Isadora (Nancy Paulsen Books; 2012).

#### Let's Talk about this Artwork

- What do you see?
- What is the **setting?** Where do you think this takes place?
- What time of day do you think it is? What clues does this picture give you?
- Trace the outline, or **silhouette**, of the tree with your finger. Can you find other areas to trace with your finger?
- If you could step inside the picture, what would it feel like?
  - Describe the **textures**: are they soft or scratchy?
  - Describe the **temperature:** is it cold, cool, warm or hot?



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#### **Supplies Needed**

- **1.** Black acrylic paint
- 2. Paintbrush
- 3. Three: half-sheet scraps of construction paper, warm or cool colors
- 4. Pencil
- **5.** 9 x 12" construction paper for background
- 6. Glue stick
- 7. Animal for silhouette

#### **Optional Supplies**

- 8. Sharpie marker
- 9. Rocks or other shapes for landscape

#### **Project Instructions**

#### <u>Project Skill</u>s

- 1) Fine / Gross Motor:
  - a) painting
  - **b)** drawing/tracing

1) Tear your three half-sheets of construction paper in strips lengthwise about 1" thick.

2) Start at one end of your full sheet of construction paper, glue torn strips one at a time while alternating colors. Try to cover your full sheet of construction paper with the torn strips.

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3) Place your animal (and landscape shapes if you have them) onto torn paper background. Use direct sunlight, move near a lamp or aim a flashlight to create dramatic shadows. Trace the outline of your animal and/or shapes with pencil or marker.



Helpful hint: if using a flashlight,

close curtains and turn off lights to get strongest shadows.

**4)** Use black acrylic paint to fill in your animal and landscape shapes.
