
EPNC tiny THURSDAYS...at home!

Enjoy Tiny Thursdays at home! Explore a DAI artwork, watch a virtual read-aloud story, and then follow along with project instructions found below!





<u>Description:</u> young artists read about the shapes of letters and "construct" their own initials from clay!

Story: "Alphabet Under Construction" written and illustrated by Denise Fleming (Square Fish; 2006)

Let's talk about this artwork!

- What do you see?
- This artwork is mostly made up of straight lines.
 - Point to a place where the lines touch.
 - Can you find lines that go from left to right across the artwork?
 - Can you also find any diagonal lines?
 - How many triangles you can find? (Hint: look where the lines meet!)
- Can you find the person who is working?
 - Do you think they are building something small or large? What do you see that makes you say that?

Materials Needed

- 1) two: 1 oz. Crayola® Model Magic®*
- **2)** two or more: markers
- nut, bolt, and/or screw

Project Instructions

1) Open one package of Crayola® Model Magic® and split it in half.





2) Color one half of the Model Magic® with marker. *Knead*, or work the clay around in your hands, the material, squishing and folding and pulling it to work the color into the clay. Repeat until you have your desired color.







3) Roll your clay into a tube shape by rolling over it with your palm on the table. Repeat with remaining pieces of Model Magic® until you have desired colors.





4) Pull off a portion of each of your colored Model Magic® pieces (about 1/3) to use for later.



5) Our first *initial*, the first letter in our first name, is the letter A. This letter has two straight lines that lean towards each other and touch at the top, and a shorter straight line that connects in the middle, about halfway down. We used a different color for each line.


Helpful Hint: think about how the first letter of your name is constructed. Is it straight or curvy? Or a combination? If you had to take it apart, what pieces would you have?








- 6) Construct your second *initial*, or the first letter of your last name, by laying out the pieces of that letter.
- 7) Use the end of a screw, bolt or nut to press down into the space where the layers of your letter overlap. It will make a cool imprint!








8) Turn your screw or bolt on its side. Roll it across the sections of the letters that aren't connected. Or choose another tool to imprint with!





9) If desired, pinch the ends of letter angles to make them pointy.



10) You have constructed your initials! What other letters can you make?
