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


Portraits & Poses

Consider pose and composition while drawing from *In the Garden* (1979) by Romare Bearden.

Supplies

- pencil
- paper
- fine-tip marker
- colored pencils
- optional: ruler







Step 1


Divide composition into three spaces by lightly drawing 2 straight, horizonal lines. The first will be for the top of the red building and the second will be for where the ground meets the building.

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Step 2


Study the artwork and notice how shapes interact and juxtapose with one another. Begin filling in the composition, focusing on the main subject first—the woman holding a garden basket—using only basic shapes for each element (ex: oval for head, rectangles for dress). Draw lightly.






Step 3

Next, add the garden in the foreground. Start with basic triangular shapes, then go back and soften straight lines to better depict the plants. Notice the **negative** spaces in between varying shapes.





Helpful hint: draw shapes that overlap in front of the woman's dress first.

Step 4

Add the background. Draw basic shapes for the red building, the house in the distance, the tree line, etc. Erase original guidelines as you go.







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Step 5

Now, refine shapes by softening their outlines as needed and add details within them. Notice the outer shape of the woman's dress and the texture of specific plants and trees.



Step 6

Lastly, celebrate the vibrant hues in this artwork by adding colors of your own with either colored pencils or markers. Trace your pencil lines with a fine-tip marker for a finished look.

Helpful hint: apply lots of pressure with colored pencils if you want to match the saturated colors in this artwork.
