BEGIN TRANSCRIPT

Welcome to February's "Object of the Month" series. My name is Fabienne. I am a Museum Guide at the Dayton Art Institute. This is a painting by Robert S. Duncanson



titled, Mayan Ruins, Yucatán, painted in 1848. What do you think might have inspired this painting?

Many artists were not able to travel widely so they depended on photographers and engravings of other artists who were able to travel. This engraving by Frederick Catherwood is believed to have inspired *Mayan Ruins, Yucatán.* Notice the similarities between the two. The practice of copying an engraving was and still is an acceptable form of inspiration.

Notice the classical treatment of the composition: the Mayan ruin being the center focus; the palm trees and the building, on each side in the foreground, frame the center image.

How would you describe Duncanson's use of scale? Perspective is a way artists help viewers understand scale. For example, the two figures in the foreground and the group of figures at the base of the temple help give us a sense of scale and perspective within the painting. The closer the figures, the larger they appear; the farther away, the smaller they are.

Duncanson's use of atmospheric perspective also help by giving a mood and a sense of depth to the scene. The horizon fades into a bluish foggy haze which lends a bit of mystery to the painting. Right away we intuitively know it is either morning or evening. You can sense the warmth of the golden sunlight washing over the temple stones.

Robert S. Duncanson is a self-taught artist born in Seneca County, New York to an African American mother and a Scottish father. Duncanson moved to Cincinnati, Ohio around 1840. Here, he worked with and was supported by abolitionists in Ohio. By the 1850s, Cincinnati was a major regional arts center with many cultural opportunities for artists. By the 1860s, the American Press had proclaimed Duncanson to be the, "best landscape painter in the West". His paintings rivaled those of Thomas Cole, Asher B. Durand and Frederick Kensett. These renowned painters were part of the original Hudson River School, a group of artists who focused on romanticizing nature of the new America.

Duncanson's pastoral landscapes demonstrate his belief in nature's harmony and beauty, full of peace and wonder. Making Him one of the most famous Midwest romantic realist painters of his time.

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I'll leave you with a fun fact: Landscape with Rainbow by Robert S. Duncanson was recently selected as the 59th Inauguration Painting. If you'd like to discover the majesty of this artwork in-person, you'll find it in the Dayton Power and Light Gallery of 19th Century American Art, Gallery 207.
