Chalk Nebulas!



Description: young artists learn cool facts about the solar system and use chalk to make a drawing inspired by nebulas!

<u>Story:</u> "<u>Solar System</u>" written and illustrated by Jill McDonald (Doubleday Books for Young Readers; 2016)

Let's talk about this artwork!

- What do you see?
- Which parts of this artwork remind you of planets? What makes you say that?
- This artwork has blended areas of color and solid lines that look like the outlines of shapes.
 - Can you find circles and ovals?
 - What shapes remind you of things in your home?
- If you were the artist, what colors would you choose to show we are in outer space?



Materials Needed

- 1) black construction paper
- 2) 4-6 chalk pieces: colors and white
- 3) paper towel/napkin
- 4) optional: blending stick/Q-tips
- 5) optional: workable fixative/aerosol hairspray
- 6) optional: newspaper/table covering



Project Skills

Project Instructions

Put newspaper or table covering down on work surfaces. Lay your construction paper on top.



2) In the center of your paper, choose a color of chalk to draw a cloud shape. Then use a Q-tip or your finger to blend the edges to make the edges of the cloud look softer.





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3) Choose 2-3 pastels or light shades of chalk. Draw squiggles and thick lines around the cloud you made. Use a finger or Q-tip to blend the chalk and help it look softer.

Helpful hint: keep paper towels handy to wipe chalk from hands.



4) Next, lay your chalk on it's side and drag it over the areas you have already colored. This is how you combine colors to make new ones! It also makes a cool texture on the paper! Choose which color areas you want to blend with your finger or Q-tip.



5) Add some white or other light colors around or on top. Blend some areas or leave areas unblended to make it more interesting!







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6) Use white chalk and dot around the paper to add your stars. Start by making large white dots.



7) Then put an X over each star. This will add a sparkling glow. Take your finger and 'pull' the white color from each X, extending the sparkle.





8) Take your chalk drawing outside or over a trash can and shake off any loose chalk.

9) Optional: spray a workable fixative on your pastel drawing to prevent smudging.



10) Name your nebula! How long would it take a spaceship to visit this place?
