



Supplies:

Step 1

Draw the mask using basic shapes, then refine the mask's exterior contour. Erase lines as needed.






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
Step 2

Draw the basic interior shapes of the mask, then refine those shapes. Add more interior shapes as needed.



Step 3

Add fine detail, texture, and value. Create value by using blending and cross-hatching techniques.
