
# DAYTON A R T INSTITUTE



### **BEGIN TRANSCRIPT**

Welcome to this episode of 'Object of the Month'. What inspires an artist? Many visitors to museums ask this question when viewing art. But the answer to this question is as varied as the artists and the artworks that we see. From where artists draw inspiration is endless but could include things like: events in their own lives, other arts like music and dance, social justice or major events, dreams, stories, myths or legends, nature.



This artwork, *Yume*, translated as "dreams" in English—what does it remind you of? How would you describe its presence? Are you drawn to it, curious, or confused? *Yume* feels light and delicate, suspended by wires and creating a layered effect. The basket-like shapes appear to float in the air.

Harue Shimomoto is inspired by nature. In her words, "I appreciate the feelings I get from even the most unspectacular nature and the small everyday life. I find the small beauties of nature are the ones that most change my view." Influenced by those small natural beauties, Harue often arranges her glass works or "environments" as she likes to refer to them, to capture her experiences of a particular season. Such as, in summer she is inspired by a storm to create *Cheerful*; in autumn, the quiet rain inspired *After the Rain*. In winter, a crispy cold sky led to *Ice Night*. Which season do you think inspired *Yume*?

Shimomoto believes the glass itself is too beautiful and so she doesn't want the viewer to concentrate on the material she is using. Many of her artworks are created by fusing and slumping glass, techniques by which she can combine, melt and mold her colored glass networks. Originally born in Japan, Shimomoto completed studies at the Cleveland Art Institute and the University of Wisconsin-Madison. She has worked as an educator and interpreter at the Pilchuck School of Glass, director of large scale works for fellow glass-artist Toots Zynsky and has been a flamework assistant to Brent K Young.

Yume is on-view in Gallery 107 of the Patterson-Kettering Wing of Asian Art at the Dayton Art Institute. When you visit with the artwork, take a moment to consider some of your most memorable experiences in nature. Thank you for joining me today.
